President's Message

FiberFest

And, what a joy it was to see so many of our members at Carolina FiberFest, both at our demonstration area in the Exhibition Building at the State Fairgrounds and shopping at the different vendor booths! Everyone seemed very excited that Lofty Fibers was there for the first time this year, and we were determined to make them feel welcome.

I was delighted to discover a bamboo and cotton blend was available there to launch the baby blanket I've just started planning and was thrilled to be able to bring along my 11 ½ year old friend who is finger knitting and learning to crochet. We both admired the work of the rug hooking group, which somehow seemed so three-dimensional, and I came home with the smallest kit to give it a try. Yes, another fiber medium to explore!

Several of our guild members were to be found in their vendor booths. Jane Clark is a member of the Fiber Fest Board of Directors, and she offered her own alpaca fiber at her Cribleman Fiber Art Studio booth. Elaina Kenyon offered products from her Avillion Farm, where she raises sheep, goats, alpaca, and rabbits for fiber. And member Jane Bynum was there representing the Twisted Threads Fiber Arts Guild.



I would like to recognize and thank all our volunteers who came to support the Triangle Weavers Guild and Carolina FiberFest, and especially Dan Galligan for his leadership in organizing our guild's people and presentation. As always, it's a lot of hard work, but when I see our folks working together as a team and especially the kids engaging with our looms, I know these are the among the best rewards we gain by being there. It was a special treat for me to see our former Vice President, Joan Beebe, volunteering at the entrance to the hall.

Elections

We find ourselves at the time of year in which the guild elects new officers. Our Nomination Committee, consisting of Pam James, Dornan Trainer, and Lori Rhodes, has been diligently searching for candidates for President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary. That's right, we need to elect all four positions, this year! I am excited and hopeful about the progress that they are making and find myself thinking often about the guidance and advice I might be able to give during the coming transition to our new leaders.

I'm often asked, "what does the President of the guild do?" I usually respond that the only thing that the President officially must do is sign our contracts, such as our lease for the Triangle Fiber Arts Center and our agreements with workshop presenters. Well, it turns out that according to the guild's "Bylaws," which were written and have been kept up to date by guild leaders over the years to spell out how we must operate, even that task can be assigned to someone other than the President by board decision.

You can read our Bylaws in the members only section of our website, and they do spell out some specifics, but overall, they provide much welcome flexibility. So, the specific tasks of the President are not necessarily so fixed and there is plenty of room to reflect the interests and vision of the person who fills that role in relation to the other members of the board and even in

relation to the committees and other volunteers and members. Tasks can be delegated or assigned to others with greater expertise or who may wish to champion a cause!

On Being TWG President

I felt a great deal of responsibility to help our guild find its way through the challenges of the great uncertainties we have experienced throughout the pandemic. But, at the same time, our board included two retired epidemiologists who gladly shared their knowledge and wisdom, and we had access to the specific policies that were being adopted by other organizations such as the John C. Campbell Folk School and the National Endowment of the Arts to guide us in the decisions we needed to make about the guild reopening.

It is true that I have taught university classes online for decades, so moving to Zoom meetings was relatively comfortable for me when we reopened our programs with online meetings and Drop-Ins in the Fall of 2020 (although much of Zoom the app itself remains a mystery to me!) But, even then, we have had a team of volunteers, including Pattie Lamb, Joan Beebe, and now others, including Jane Patterson, Sarah Warren, and Dornan Trainer. Over the past couple of years, these team members have worked together to make a transition to online meetings, workshops, and classes, that have also come to include Show and Tell as well as presentations by far away speakers we might never have been able to bring in person to share their stories and work with us. This team has been able to record our online meetings and share them with our members using our own YouTube channel through our members-only section of the website.

Personal Reflections

In the end, the experiences that I've had as the TWG Board President (and now Past President and President Pro Tempore) have led me to understand that what the person in this role does is work with other members, including other board members, committee chairs, volunteers, those who come to Drop-Ins and Study Groups, and those who are engaged through any other relevant forms of encounter such as emails and social media, to figure out what the guild most needs.

With input and support from these other members, and even other guilds and arts organizations, the President works to fill those needs as best they can with the resources that they either have readily available or can manage to assemble to get it done. That could be volunteers, it could be a grant, it could be something like the Listening Project, or training in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. The latter is currently being offered to the guild by both the Orange County Arts Council and the Mid-Atlantic Fiber Association.

If you are interested in knowing more about what is involved in serving on our board and committees, please do reach out to me or other board members. All TWG members are always welcome to attend our board meetings as guests, and it is an excellent way to get to know more about the issues we embrace and seek to resolve in the best interests of our organization. We are interested in your input and seek your involvement. Many fine opportunities await!

You will make string heddles to put on the loom, warp the loom and weave. No experience required.

Students will learn the basics of how to use a sewing machine, how to measure fabric and apply interfacing, how to insert a lining and install a zipper.

No previous sewing experience is necessary, but students must bring their own sewing machine and zipper foot. The Guild has one sewing machine available for someone to use.

Immersion dyeing, where an entire skein or cloth is dyed a single color, will also be addressed to create matching wefts.

This class is also appropriate for those wanting to learn the basics of fiber reactive dyes for cloth. The class includes a brief discussion of color mixing, dye safety and dye painting techniques. All levels welcome. Students must be able to prepare their own warps and/or wefts.

This class is perfect for the student with little or no prior weaving experience. We will weave a set of small cotton mats that can be used as mug mats or saved as samples in a notebook for future reference. You will learn to plan your project, decipher a threading draft, measure and wind a warp, dress the loom from back to front, and weave a set of from 4 to 6 mats, each with a different treadling pattern of your choosing.

For the student who completes the first project quickly and is able to spend some independent time weaving during the TFAC drop in hours on Tuesday and Saturday afternoons, there may be an opportunity to put on a second warp with a different threading for a wall hanging sampler or more mats. This would be a great way to reinforce what you learned during the first half of the class. No weaving experience required.

Listening Project Update

You spoke.....We Listened

As a continuation of celebrating our 50th, we thought it might be helpful to find out from you...our members... what do you think makes this Guild so special and what you wished the Guild would do differently in the years ahead. Given that the pandemic was such a disruptive force and changed most Guild operations in some way, it also provided us with an opening to think how to move forward and resume our programs in ways that might build on newly discovered methods (e.g. zoom) and meet more of our community's needs.

Beginning with our first meeting of the Fiscal Year in August we embarked on a "Listening Project". We reached out to talk in small group discussions ("Listening Circles"), starting with folks who attended the August meeting and then with as many study groups as we could schedule. We also opened the opportunity to the Guild at large through the website. The discussions were framed around answering three important questions:

- Q1. What do you value most about the Guild?
- Q2. What do you wish the Guild did differently?
- Q3. How might you be able to contribute to Guild Activities or help implement the changes you wish to see?

After "posting" ideas on whiteboards using sticky notes, lively and engaging conversation took place in all circles, which was no surprise given the creative energy that our members bring. Thank you to all those who generously shared their thoughts. And while the numbers referenced in the discussion refer to the individual "posts", the discussion that took place around the ideas amplified many of the posted thoughts and confirmed that others were in agreement.... Or not.

SO...... What did you have to say?

There were just shy of 200 responses to the first question, and several common themes. Community related responses were the most common - Sharing a love of fiber arts, inspiring each other, providing support and informal mentorship, making deep and meaningful connections were among the thoughts expressed. The education program was close behind as members specifically mentioned the many learning opportunities the guild provides and applauded the variety of offerings and format. Guild resources – TFAC, library, communication vehicles were all identified as providing value to so many. Our takeaway is that those programs that enhance community and learning must remain our focus as we plan for the years to come.

The responses to the second question, 124 ideas, align with the themes above with Meetings (a community activity) and Education prompting the most suggestions on how

we might do things differently. There were 51 comments on Meetings – covering a range of subtopics:

Frequency, format, location and programming. Some wished for meetings to occur at daytime to avoid night driving, others preferred night and weekends to accommodate work and other day time obligations. Some preferred zoom sessions, others in-person meetings. Some suggested more time be dedicated to socializing and less "business", others wanted more thematic meetings and still others suggested extended meetings with hands-on components.

After reviewing all the individual response we had one clear take away – A single format, schedule and location will not be sufficient to support our community and maximize accessibility and participation. And while the content of some meetings is governed by our by-laws – what else could we do? You may have already noticed that while for many years Guild meetings followed a set schedule and location we have already tried to vary format, location and schedule. We will hold some meetings at TFAC so that everyone can enjoy the wonderful creative space that has been crafted. We will continue to hold some meetings at the Seymour center in Chapel Hill where a well-lit parking lot makes people feel safe. We will try to incorporate Zoom into on-site meetings so those who can't drive or can't spare the travel time can participate from home or view the content on demand. We are minimizing "Guild Business section" or scheduling as a pre-meeting segment so those who don't want that content can simply "skip" it.

We are also looking at reaching out to speakers from outside our region who can join via Zoom and provide us with much valued content. We will continue to try to tweak our approach to meetings and assess how things are "working". We will try to publish a schedule with enough lead time that you can plan accordingly.

There were so many rich ideas that came from these discussions and improvements are already underway. Some of these efforts include:

- Improving methods to better support mentoring: A mentor highlight page is planned for our web site that will allow folks looking for mentoring to see a roster of mentors they can reach out to.
- We are providing specific programs during drop-in sessions, reviving the Illoomination program and expect to provide both in person and zoom based learning.
- Discussing how best to structure "show and tell" so there is time for tell/discuss as well as show .. We know that so many value this part of our programming and so many members wish they could have time to learn more from each creator.
- Hosting technology learning sessions to show members how to use the new equipment the Guild has for projection, zoom, and photography.
- Recruiting a volunteer coordinator who can help connect those running Guild programs who need help with those who can give it.

Other ideas are also under discussion and will be shared as they take more concrete form.

IS THIS IT? NO!!!! This article only provides some of the highlights from this initiative. We will be hosting a zoom discussion to go over the results in a little more

detail to those who are interested in participating. Look for the announcement in your weekly communication from Lori. You can continue to submit ideas and express yourself via the website link. You can request a copy of the response detail – just send an email to Debbie Silar (d.silar@yahoo.com). While our membership numbers are robust, our list of able volunteers for ongoing roles is less so. All of our programming – the community, education and resources you value – require more muscle to sustain them. Please consider stepping up and volunteering – there is no better way to nurture community than actively engaging in it.

Book Review By Paula Baumann



ikat: The Essential Handbook to Weaving Resist-Dyed Cloth
By Mary Zicafoose

Awarded artist, world-class dyer, teacher, student, and world traveler -- all describe the dedicated life of weaver Mary Zicafoose. Each of these attributes is evident in her instructional and beautifully illustrated book beginning with her definition of ikat. She punctuates with photos from her travels. Mary has a spiritual side that also shines through in the brief stories associated with each chapter.

The book moves directly into its instructional purpose starting in Chapter 2: "Equipment, Materials & Tools". From this point forward the reader is learning how to create an ikat through each step in her process including chapters on methods and dyeing. Photos are clear and specific to the points that she makes in her discussions. Ikats can easily be tried, and resist wrapped right on the warping board without a special two-board stretching system! The beauty of the book, however, is that she gives directions and templates for making the stretching board system, for creating cartoons for wrapping and equipment for warp shifting on the loom.

Projects include warp ikat scarves, stoles, and a table runner. These are weaver centric directions including structure, equipment, yarns, dyes, supplies, warp length and ends, setts, notes and both process with fringe design detail. Wrap types include random variations, shifted warp chevrons, arrows and stripes with Tencel, cotton, and silk yarns. Resisting for multiple colors are also part of several projects. For those who wish to test weft ikat there is a placemat project plus a wonderful double ikat scarf. This is a handbook for weavers of all skill levels including those who are beginning their journey and who love the feathery, blurred designs.

With years of practice and teaching Mary also includes up to date resources for suppliers, where to study weaving and reading materials for ikat. Published in 2020 by Interweave Press within the Weaver's Studio the book is part of the TWG library. The detail and descriptions are testimony to her years of teaching and self-taught artistry.
